Art in the West at the High Desert Museum

he High Desert Museum has unveiled its annual *Art in the West* juried exhibition and online silent auction, this year sharing the work of more than 70 regionally and nationally acclaimed artists and including more than 100 pieces.

Every year, *Art in the West* highlights art inspired by the landscapes, history, cultures and wildlife of the High Desert. The vast region stretches from the eastern slope of the Cascades and Sierras to the Wyoming Basin and Colorado Plateau.

Visitors will see an array of mediums in the show this year, from fused

glass to feathers. The exhibit features sculptures, paintings and photography expressing responses to the region in mediums ranging from oil to acrylic, pastel to charcoal, mixed media to encaustic, and bronze to branches.

"We are thrilled to welcome new artists to the *Art in the West* exhibition this year — the wide diversity of artwork makes the exhibit engaging every year for Museum visitors," said Museum Executive Director Dana Whitelaw, Ph.D. "Art enthusiasts are sure to find a favorite piece of the High Desert.

"The High Desert is often subtle—the vast skies, the green of the desert



in spring, the rivers and tributaries, and the peoples whose cultures have flourished in this place for time immemorial," continued Whitelaw. "This dynamic sparks an immense range of interpretations and creativity, and it makes *Art in the West* an engaging exhibition every year."

The 2023 Art in the West Curator's Choice Award goes to a new artist to the show, Taylor Manoles, for the 38" x 38" oil painting Painted Hills. Manoles lives in Bend and shows her work across the Pacific Northwest, as well as on various online platforms. Her artwork explores themes of faith and the human experience through contemporary landscapes. Painting is both a cathartic practice and how she celebrates and remembers the goodness in the world around her. In 2022, her painting Sparks Lake Sunrise was chosen for the cover of Southwest Art Magazine.

The 2023 Art in the West Jury's Choice Award winner is Barbara Van Cleve. The acclaimed Montana-based photographer documents the beauty of the West through rich black-and-white photography. Van Cleve's award-winning image, Moving On, a 16" x 20" archival pigment print, is one of several pieces the artist has in this year's exhibition.

Van Cleve begged her parents for a Kodak Brownie box camera at age 11 to start chronicling her life growing up on a Montana ranch. She carried it everywhere, and as the years went on the gear changed but the habit didn't. Today, Van Cleve has had over 100 one-person exhibitions and participated in 180 group exhibitions.

Additional renowned artists also featured in this year's *Art in the West* include Dawn Emerson, Michael Weber, Kat Houseman, Robert Martinez and sculptor Rebecca Tobey, and past *Art in the*

West winners Rudi Broschofsky, Sarah B. Hansen and Hadley Rampton.

Silent bidding is available online, with the opportunity to purchase artwork outright. A gallery guide of the exhibition artwork is on the Museum's website at highdesertmuseum.org/aiw, as is bidding. Opening bids range from \$225 to \$8,500.

Bidding continues through the exhibition's closing at 7pm on Friday, September 22.

Proceeds from *Art in the West* support the artists and the Museum's exhibitions and programs, bringing science, art and history education to lifelong learners throughout the region.



She was one of the first Americans invited to exhibit work in the Lausanne Biennale in Switzerland. A self-taught weaver, Johansen attributed some of her artistic influence to her Native American heritage and her early years living in Hood River.

David, whose career was launched with a sold out show at Maxwell Galleries in San Francisco, has been a professional artist for 57 years.





August's featured show at Sage Gallery is the work of two talented artists, Janet Frost and Joren




Traveller. Both painters have on display a selection of their landscape and wildlife paintings.





ristine Cooper, owner of Cooper Art and Abode, is a local abstract painter who uses art to communicate a multitude of thoughts and feelings. Kristine has been an artist for most of her life, recalling her early years being spent playing with chalk on the sidewalk.

"I discovered art as a child, and immediately felt a pull to create with my hands," Kristine said. "Through art, I feel like I can be my best self, and create something out of the chaos of my life. I was born with a birth defect, my dad had a traumatic injury, and I was raised under the poverty line. I lacked resources or any idea that an art world existed away from our small home in Spokane, but I did know I was born to create and use my imagination."

While Kristine didn't grow up in an environment that helped foster her love for art and creativity, she didn't let that stop her from pursuing her passion. She attended Seattle Pacific University to pursue a career as a teacher before switching her major to fine arts, deciding it was time to fully commit to her art. "I love kids and working with them, but I felt like I needed to create something more dynamic, something with my hands," Kristine said.

Despite having a degree in fine arts and taking classes on the subject, Kristine said she feels like art majors are rarely set on a clear path towards success; lessons on how to become a successful, professional and financially stable artist didn't seem to be a big priority.

Kristine graduated in 2016 and discovered Bend through a friend. She decided to take a visit and explore the area for herself one day, and she immediately fell in love. She moved soon after, and picked up a job on the side to earn some income while also pursuing her art after her regular work hours.

For about four years, Kristine would work her day job and pursue her dream of being an artist in her limited free time. Eventually in 2020, Kristine decided to take the leap, quit her day job and pursue art full time," As scary as it was to do that in 2020 with the pandemic going on, I felt like a weight was lifted from my shoulders and I could finally be who I really wanted to be," she said.

Kristine found success jumping into full-time work. She said that this transition allowed her to spend more time on her work, exploring her sparks of creativity. Before she quit her day job, she would sometimes get a creative idea she'd want to explore, but then would have to wait several hours before she was actually able to explore the idea, sometimes losing that spark. As a full-time artist, Kristine now has the ability to explore her creativity as it comes, wasting no time in expressing her emotions through brushstrokes and bright colors.

"I could spend more time in the pieces and actually fulfill my creative ideas," she said. "I can go and create whenever. There is more space for me to be a professional artist."

According to Kristine, fully exploring her creativity means exploring both the good and the bad. As an artist, Kristine aims to paint with emotion in mind, as opposed to creating something that resembles a photograph.

An example of this is her painting entitled, "Roots" which is based on a hiking trip she took with her fiancé on the Southern Oregon coast. She recalls taking in the spectacular oceanside vista, but also recalls the salt in the air, the cool breeze on her skin and hearing the rhythmic ocean's tide come in and out. "Roots" encapsulates that entire experience.

"I'll add dots, small movements, lines, spray paint and metallic elements of silver and gold to represent different emotions in each painting," Kristine said.

Aside from representing emotion, Kristine enjoys using metallic elements to make her paintings more dynamic; that is, they might look a bit different depending on where they are hung, what kind of light is hitting them and even what time of day they are being observed.

Kristine's work typically shies away from muted tones and avoids overusing blacks, whites and grays. Instead, her work is typically vibrant and relies on color theory to evoke certain emotions from the viewers.

"Many artists lean so much on black, white, gray and muted colors, and I don't do that as much," Kristine said. "My goal is to have paintings change moods, brighten the space, and make people feel good. That's been one of my favorite parts of bringing that art to life."

Kristine does admit that all of these unique elements, and therefore the uniqueness of her art, did raise the concern that they might not become that popular, or commercially successful. However, Kristine discovered that when the right people see her work, they connect with it on a deep level.

"Comparison made it scary to start like this, because my work definitely stuck out. I've experimented with making some work more neutral or more appealing to that other crowd, but it misses the soul for me, so I stopped going in that direction. I love color theory and I love the way it makes me feel. People may be apprehensive in the beginning, but they change over time," Kristine said. "I'm comfortable with my work not being for everyone, but for the people who it is, it changes their life."

At this point, Kristine feels like Bend and Central Oregon have embraced her for these differences. This can be seen from her commercial success, having a portfolio full of clients like Big Raven Yoga, Free Range Equipment, REI, Pacific Hound, and a number of corporate murals.

In the future, Kristine would enjoy working on more collaborations with companies and other local artists. Aside from her work on a canvas, she wants to break into 3D work, creating new art out of wood, textiles and other 3D elements.

You can find Kristine's work at most of the fests around town (SummerFest, FallFest) as well as many local popups at cafes, bars and farmers markets. Kristine said that these have been great opportunities to sell her work, and connect with community members and other artists.



Red Chair Gallery Presents

or landscape photographer Mike Putnam, timing is the key to success. Many of his stunning shots show brilliant arrays of mountain wildflowers or blazing autumn foliage, with the Cascade Mountains as a backdrop. They are the result of his painstaking effort to be there on the day when the display is at its most magnificent. Putnam is a showcase artist at Red Chair Gallery in August.

During the spring, summer and fall, Putnam spends about five days a week scouting his photo shoots before he even sets up his equipment. "It's a lot of hiking and searching and waiting for the conditions to be right and then coming back at the peak time," he says. He has become an expert on identification of mountain and desert area plants so that he knows what most wildflowers look like before they bloom. He backpacks or hikes into an area to locate the flowers and then calculates when to come back to get the best photos.


To catch the gorgeous pink blooms of the hedgehog cactus shown here, he first consulted numerous online trip reports from hikers in the Spring Basin Wilderness near John Day. The reports indicated that the cactus usually blooms there in late April so that was when he made the first 14-mile round trip trek to find them. He was too early so he returned the following week and found them in glorious bloom. It was worth all the study and exertion, he says. "They're really quite adorable for something so spiny."


Putnam fell in love with Central Oregon's landscape after moving here from Kentucky in 1999. He grew up in Lexington, Kentucky, famed for its Thoroughbred racing horses, attended Kenyon College and then veterinary school at Auburn University. He returned to Lexington and worked as a vet for the area's horse farms. With an average horse farm client needing constant care for 150-200 horses, the work was grueling and soon made Putnam reconsider his career. After falling in love with Oregon on a visit here, he and his wife decided to move and he quickly found a position at Tumalo Veterinary Hospital, where he worked for 15 years.


Putnam had always been an amateur photographer and outdoorsman. Hiking and backpacking in Oregon with his camera became a great joy. About ten years ago, he left veterinary medicine to devote himself full time to photography. He uses an old-fashioned large format 4x5 film camera to create fine art prints with exceptional detail. He often builds his own frames for traditional prints but more recently has begun making large metal prints without frames. The aluminum-based prints provide more "pop" for the vibrant colors of his landscapes, he says.


Besides wildflowers, his portfolio includes many stunning scenes of waterfalls, rivers, lakes and the desert. His landscapes adorn the walls of St. Charles Medical Center and many area medical and corporate offices, and he often stages shows at places like the Commons Café and Patagonia in downtown Bend. In September, he will have a show at the Deschutes Brewery restaurant on Bond Street.

After 30 years of following the ebb and flow of life, Pamela finally found her way to make her home in Central Oregon. She paints the beautiful mountain peaks, lakes, and forests to the west, but she is always happiest and most inspired when her paintbrush mixes the muted greens and violets that are the language of the high desert.





For August, Hood Avenue Art is featuring artists Art Blumenkron, Susie Zeitner and JoAnn Burgess.

"I've been working with wood ever since I was a teenager and wanted to build my own speakers for my Hi-Fi," Wood Artist Art Blumenkron said. "I was never very serious about improving my skill until we moved to Sisters eight years ago. Now that I have a real woodworking shop and the proper tools it's amazing what can be accomplished! My designs tend to try and bring forms occurring in nature inside. When I look at a slab or board over a few days, designs tend to pop into my mind. I construct pieces of furniture mentally, usually on my morning walk in the forest. I love patterns that I see repeating all around me pictured in wood grain and figure.

Susie Zeitner is a fused glass artist. Her work in glass began in 1998 when she thought about the possibility of making large bowls into lighting fixtures.

She has been commissioned to create fixtures in two large hotels, multiple restaurants and the 139-piece assisted living facility called The Lodge in Sisters.

She currently fabricates glass and steel totems made from fused glass mosaic. They range from 5' to 7'. She works with recycled steel, welds into forms and covers them in glass. Susie is also is currently producing two-dimensional wall art pieces through painting then fusing in kiln glass, and mounting on rusted metal.
