Local Bend artist Bob Newhart (newhartist.com) has been selected as the Artist in Residence at the Bend Visitor Center for July 2025.

Because First Friday falls on the 4th of July national holiday this year, the official First Friday Art Walk for July is scheduled for Friday, July 11 from 5-8pm.

In addition to being the featured artist at Bend Visitor Center, Newhart has launched the 1st Friday Artwalk Detectives Club. The Detective Club is meant to engage children and those that are young at heart to discover and get into the Bend art scene by discovering paintings around Bend.

Each Art Detective will can pick up a special sticker pamphlet at the Bend Visitor Center to use as they collect artwork stickers at participating Bend businesses. Participating businesses include Bend Visitor Center, Cascade Cottons, Dudley's Bookshop & Café, FjallRaven, Leapin' Lizards, Lotus Moon Boutique, Red Chair Gallery and Staghorn Mercantile.

Newhart says his approach to painting is entwined with the idea of painting music. He says music, especially improvisational jazz, is probably the highest authority on how to live life. Painting is a way to get close to that — the silent brush in search of sound. "If I could approximate — in art — the colors, notes, rhythms, tones and textures that Miles Davis, Thelonious Monk, John Coltrane, Brad Mehldau, (and today Torrey Newhart) put into sound, then I would be very pleased."



Beginning July 5, the annual *Art in the West* juried exhibition and silent auction will be on display at the Museum, showcasing over 120 traditional and contemporary works that honor the landscapes, wildlife, people, cultures and history of the High Desert. The full collection is available now on our online auction page.

Continuing through September 7, *Frank S. Matsura: Portraits from the Borderland*, examines Indigenous representation and identity during a period of regional transformation. *Frank S. Matsura: Portraits from the Borderland* will feature 39 photographs recovered from Matsura's archive paired with period-specific cultural

items from the Indigenous Plateau, a High Desert region that encompasses the Columbia River and its tributaries. Exploring Indigenous representation through detailed photography as well as objects, the exhibition spotlights some of Matsura's most culturally significant work against a backdrop of regional transformation in the early 20th century.

Continuing through October 5, the Museum's newest exhibit, *Patterns at Play: Fractals in Nature*, showcases how repetition and patterns intertwine in the natural world. The exhibit allows visitors to build their own patterns while an animation creates new fractals right before their eyes. Fractals are never-ending patterns that repeat the same shape at bigger and smaller scales. Fractals in nature appear to humans as messy, even chaotic. Trees grow by branching in every direction; seashells swirl around and around. Mathematicians, artists and naturalists have noticed these patterns for centuries.





The Oxford Hotel is hosting encaustic artist Janice Rhodes throughout the month of July.

Janice paints in a medium dating back to Ancient Greece. Fayum funeral masks for mummies were painted with encaustics and can be seen in museums today. The medium consists of beeswax, resin and pigment. She melts these ingredients then brushes them onto a birch board. Each layer has to be reheated and fused before the next layer is applied. "I feel a certain amount of freedom in this technique that

requires that you 'go with the flow.' My paintings are usually very textured with brilliant color."





Saddle Up: Ranchers and Rodeo Life of The Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs

Now Open at the Museum of Warm Springs

The Museum at Warm Springs will open its major 2025 exhibition, *Saddle Up: Ranchers and Rodeo Life of The Confederated Tribes of Warm Springs*, on Thursday, June 26, 2025. It will be on view through Saturday, September 27, 2025.

The exhibition coincides with the Warm Springs Tribes' 56th Annual Pi-Ume-Sha Treaty Days Powwow and Celebration, which takes place June 27-29 in Warm Springs. 2025 also marks the 170th anniversary of the signing of the Treaty of 1855, which established the Warm Springs Reservation. *Saddle Up* is curated by Warm Springs Museum Curator and Exhibition Coordinator Angela Anne Smith (Warm Springs, Yakama, Nez Perce and Diné).

Saddle Up will highlight the history and experiences of Warm Springs ranch families and rodeo culture. It will illustrate, through historic documents, art, objects, family interviews and photographs, the experiences of Warm Springs ranchers along with the economic and cultural transition from a way of life based on hunting, fishing, gathering of food on the land and trade to one based on cash.

“This is a wonderful way to highlight an important part of The Museum’s extensive collections related to the Warm Springs Tribes’ longstanding traditions around ranching and rodeos, which have always been an important way of life for us,” said Museum Executive Director Elizabeth A. Woody (Warm Springs, Yakama and Diné). “The exhibit will illustrate the history and lives of Warm Springs families who depend on the land for

Wasco and Paiute).

access to our first foods and how the broad themes of ranching and rodeos are shared among both tribal and non-tribal people and are deeply grounded in Central Oregon.”

In April, The Museum was awarded \$7,500 from the Oregon State Capitol Foundation for the development of a digital version of *Saddle Up* that will be showcased on the Foundation’s website at oregoncapitol.com and for a physical exhibit that will be on display at the Oregon State Capitol (dates TBA). Funding is also going toward a video that is currently in production under the direction of filmmaker, director, cinematographer and storyteller LaRonn Katchia (Warm Springs,

The Stitchin' Post

A Piece of Sisters History Turns 50

Jean Wells, the founder and owner of Sisters' Stitchin' Post, has loved to sew ever since she was a little girl. So much so that she went to OSU to become a home economics teacher, giving her the experience and skills needed to open her business in 1975.

"I opened The Stitchin' Post in what is now the bar in the Sisters Saloon restaurant," said Jean. "My intent was to have a space where I could teach sewing and quilting and sell supplies to my students. I had been a home economics teacher in Beaverton for eight years after getting out of college. Being involved

with education and seeing people learn is still a joy to me today."

Jean says the mission of her store has always been about education and inspiration. She spent her time connecting with the community and sharing the skills that she loves so much. Early on, Jean got connected with a young woman named Cathi Howell who had opened up a consignment boutique. She had the idea of hosting a summer festival and asked Jean about hanging quilts in the common area of her store.

"I had only made two quilts at the time, and they were smaller quilts for my children, so I borrowed the ten family quilts that my mother kept in her cedar chest... Both of my grandmothers and great-grandmothers were makers of quilts," said Jean. "On the day of the show, several ladies who lived in Sisters and Black Butte Ranch came to our show. Several suggested that we should hang quilts out the next year too, and we have been doing it now for 50 years."

Jean continued, saying, "The show grew from there as quilters in the community gathered to take classes in the stores, and one of the women, Elizabeth Duncan, thought we should have a quilt guild, so she organized the East of the Cascades Quilters. The guild is still here in Sisters with about 60 members. A few years later, as the show grew and became a lot more work, it became a nonprofit run by Dawn Boyd, our executive director."

This year at the Sisters Outdoor Quilt Show, there will be a little over 1,000 quilts on display. "Being the 50th anniversary this year, we wanted to focus on the history of the show," said Jean, "and feature the quilters' work in Central Oregon. I will have a display of five decades of quilts that I have created, including a series of sampler quilts from the 28 I made when teaching the class over the years. The original ten quilts from the first show will be displayed at the quilt show office in the log building on Hood Ave."

Fifty years later, education is still the main goal of the store, which is now run by Jean's daughter, Valori Wells. They still find ways to bring in nationally renowned

teachers and put on educational workshops in the spring and fall.

"Valori has built off of an education program that I started in 1978 with one instructor to the present-day Quilter's Affair (QA), which takes place the five days before the show and is held in the Sisters High School," said Jean. "This year there are 36 instructors that come from as far away as Australia. Student groups who do fundraising help us out with logistics, and a local deli provides lunches for the quilters."

Over the years, Jean and her team have learned quite a few lessons in running the Stitchin' Post — a big one being that while tough times don't last, tough people do. Opening up in a town of 500 people, Jean took a big risk with her business that has paid off. Through COVID, wildfires, recessions and more, the Stitchin' Post has remained a staple of the Sisters and Central Oregon art scene.

While business practices change to meet growing needs and new trends over the years, Jean says that the biggest thing that has remained the same is the true personal connection that she has built with her customers.

In terms of what lies ahead for her and the store, Jean said there are plans for continued exploration of new ideas and developing more social media, building off of her daughter Val's successful social media push during COVID. Aside from that, they hope to keep tradition alive and keep on celebrating the Sisters Outdoor Quilt Show for years to come.

Artists' Gallery Sunriver Celebrates 15 Years

Midge and Gene Thomas had a vision. They wanted to create a space for artists in Central Oregon to help each other show their work. In 2010, Midge opened a store in the Sunriver Village with several local artists. The artists worked collaboratively to learn and sell each others' art and maintained the space. After a few years, the gallery moved to a larger space to take on more artists, where it remains today.

Midge and Gene transferred ownership of the gallery to Bonnie Junell, Karla Proud and Susan Harkness-Williams in 2017 due to declining health. The three artists continued to recruit new members and grow the gallery. The gallery was always known for its Second Saturday art receptions that drew regulars and visitors alike to enjoy the art. The gallery remained open through COVID restrictions, thriving as more people chose the quiet of Sunriver to busier vacations elsewhere.

Karla and Susan eventually transferred their management stake to Jim Fister in 2021. Together, Jim and Bonnie oversaw a significant renovation of the gallery to improve the appearance and add even more space for artists. Today, the gallery has 34 working artists and ten others who show their work on commission. This July marks the 15th anniversary of the gallery.

The gallery continues to hold its Second Saturday receptions as well as an annual Locals' Weekend that collects food for the South County food bank. It participates in many other events to benefit the community as well. It also works with the Sunriver Resort to curate the Betty Gray Gallery, providing additional support for artists in the region, including a Youth Art Challenge to showcase future artists.

From humble beginnings, the Artists' Gallery Sunriver continues to provide a showcase for artists and a place for visitors to enjoy a wide variety of art. Come visit the gallery in July as it celebrates its 15th anniversary for the entire month with activities every weekend and see how the vision continues to evolve.

Red Chair Gallery Presents Mary Jo Weiss ~ Jeweler

If your taste in jewelry leans toward stunning but understated sophistication, you may want to get acquainted with Mary Jo Weiss. Her distinctive work is showcased throughout July at Red Chair Gallery.

Weiss is a skilled metalsmith whose artistry spans a variety of techniques. She embosses sheets of sterling silver, gold, copper or niobium with textures reminiscent of spiderwebs, bamboo or wood grain, then transforms them into elegant pieces of jewelry. In one example of her creative process, she cuts small pieces of niobium, anodizes them to produce vibrant hues and pairs them with sterling silver or gold to create eye-catching bracelets. Many of her designs are accented with Oregon gemstones cut by a local geologist, such as holly blue chalcedony, sunstone or Priddy Plume agate — a striking local stone known for its coppery red and cream patterns that is found near Madras.

Originally from the Midwest, Weiss earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts degree from Northern Illinois University. She honed her skills in jewelry repair and fabrication while working at various jewelry stores, completing coursework through the Gemological Institute of America (GIA) along the way. In 1990, she relocated to Central Oregon, first settling in Bend and later Sisters, where she raised two daughters and worked as the bench jeweler at The Jewel for 18 years. There she crafted custom pieces for the store's owner and also sold her own creations under the name Josephine Weiss Designs.



In 2012, Weiss became a full-time independent jeweler. Over the years, she has developed a loyal group

of clients who commission custom work — some of which have evolved into signature pieces. One notable example is *Embrace*, a pendant originally designed for a client who requested a duplication of a mother and child in a heartfelt hug. Created in sterling silver and brass, with a semi-precious stone accent, the piece resonated widely. Weiss has since sold hundreds of *Embrace* pendants and expanded the design into matching earrings and bracelets.

With precious metals prices on the rise, many customers bring Weiss heirloom or unworn pieces to be reimaged. She recycles the metal and incorporates the original gemstones into fresh, contemporary designs that honor the past while creating something new.

Dedicated to continuous learning, Weiss attends at least one metalsmithing workshop each year. At the renowned Penland School of Craft in North Carolina, she explored kinetic jewelry, learning to create pieces that spin, slide and fold. One such creation is a collapsible sterling silver pendant, gemstone-studded and whimsically reminiscent of the vintage camping cups of the 1960s.

Connection to the local art community is important to Weiss. She is a member of the Sisters Art Association and continues to sell her jewelry at The Jewel. She previously taught jewelry making at Central Oregon Community College and now offers private lessons and workshops in her Wilson Avenue studio. As a longtime member of Central Oregon Metal Arts Guild (COMAG), she also participates in their annual show each November at Open Space Event Studio in Bend.



Lilli Worona's *Maritime Siren* Calls Listeners into Story & Song

Lilli Worona's new album *Maritime Siren* doesn't just ask you to listen — it invites you to journey. With her signature blend of Americana, storytelling and sonic atmosphere, the singer-songwriter has created a collection that explores love, memory, self-reflection and the quiet landscapes that shape us. "I think the theme for this album originated from a drive to want to tell stories that move people," Lilli says. "What better way to move people than to create musical narratives that center around important relationships and the places that shaped those relationships?"

The title track was born during a solo winter trip to the Oregon Coast. As Lilli watched the storm-churned ocean, she imagined the lives of sailors from ages past. That vision eventually evolved into a song loosely inspired by *The Odyssey* — and set the tone for an album rooted in vivid imagery and lyrical depth. Other tracks include *Cathedral Rock*, a fictional love story set in Sedona, and *Rich*, inspired by a hiking guide Lilli met in the Costa Rican rainforest.

While her 2021 debut *Between the Lines* drew from personal experiences and melody-first writing, *Maritime Siren* takes a different path. "For *Maritime Siren*, I was more focused on the storytelling aspect," she explains. "Most lyrics on the album were painstakingly edited and re-written several times until they fully encapsulated the character or the story I was trying to tell."

This time around, lyrics came first, melodies followed, and Lilli shaped her vocal performance to reflect each character's emotional state. The result is a more contemplative, immersive record — less autobiographical, more theatrical in scope. Still, it remains grounded in honest emotion.

That same intentionality carries into her live shows, which she'll be performing across Oregon this summer — often alongside guitarists and fellow singer-songwriters John Shipe while in the valley and Mike Biggers here in Central Oregon. "I hope listeners will hear the same quality of emotional presence in my live performances," Lilli says. "We aim to authentically tell stories — but we also aim to just have a really good time." The trio brings humor, playfulness and "nerdy jokes" to the stage, offering audiences a chance to disconnect from daily chaos and connect with something deeper. "The serious part of this whole endeavor was in recording and getting the lyrics just right," she says. "But in live performance, the goal is to just allow audiences to... be fully present, have fun, relax and connect to one another."

Throughout July, Toriizaka Art will be featuring works by Vu Thang, a unique and innovative contemporary Vietnamese artist. Several of his newest arrivals were influenced by cave drawings and traditional sculptures created by the hill tribe people in Northern Vietnam. His primitive figures speak to universal experiences, emotions, and feelings.

Other figurative pieces were created using a multitude of materials (wood, hemp, canvas, fabric, and clay) and the artist uses the properties of each material to help inform the entire piece. Visitors to the gallery can see how he has incorporated scraps of traditionally patterned clothing from the Red and Black Dao hill tribe peoples into his works, sewing them onto the canvas, and integrating them into the larger piece.

Creating art since his earliest days as a child, Vu Thang pushes the boundaries of both the traditional and the contemporary with confidence and without regard for how others have created art before him, maintaining a childlike naiveté and exploration of various artistic techniques in his works.



Jewelry maker Mat Garriott uses traditional techniques to make jewelry with silver, gold and precious gems. He produces simple, elegant pieces that can be worn every day as well as with more formal attire. No trendy stuff for this artist! Garriott's pieces will remain stylish for many years. Although extremely talented, the artist is primarily self-taught. While undergoing chemotherapy in late 2012, Garriott discovered a book about jewelry making. Once on the road to a healthy recovery, he made a radical career change, leaving the corporate world to be a full-time maker.

Carolyn Waissman, well-known local photographer, has been capturing the essence of wildlife in her photographic pieces for a long time. It would be interesting to know how many Sunriver homes display a beautiful doe and fawn, a snarling badger or a big fuzzy bear. Currently Waissman has been attracted to the explosion of spring and summer colors in Central Oregon. Sand lilies in the desert to wild iris in the Sunriver meadow — wildflowers abound. 


